Three Act Story Structure	There is an attempt to organize the story in three acts, but a beginning, middle and/or end cannot be clearly identified. Connection of ideas are somewhat disjointed. Camera Care	Relies upon others to manage most camera features and doesn't take initiative to independently use equipment.	Demonstrates understanding of most camera features, but relies on some extra help to sufficiently use equipment. Shot Styles and Composition	Little variation of shot styles, no use of framing techniques (rule of thirds), and video footage is often distracting to the audience. Not a clear motivation for shots to purposefully convey meaning in the scene.	Project shows understanding of appropriate use of most shot styles and some framing techniques. Occasional features such as pan and zoom are distracting to the audience. Motivation for shots is frequently evident, but not always. Audio	Audio is often difficult to interpret and distracts audience so they have difficulty understanding the story. Editing and Exporting	The summary of ideas is supported with few details and facts and the sequence of events is confusing at times. Text is frequently difficult to read and may not be included when appropriate. Assistance is required to properly export final product for screening.	Editing techniques are occasionally distracting, with some transitions used without purpose. Text, including titles and credits, is mostly readable, but not always. Some guidance is needed to export the final product for screening.	Editing techniques, including importing media, transitions, text, pacing (length of shots), and audio provide a cohesive and compelling final product. Text	The text presents one or two ideas and doesn't always support images. Not all text is legible. Titles or credits may be missing or not readable. Copyright	Several issues related to copyright are evident, which may include use of non fair use audio and images, and doesn't always provide credit for sources. Voiceover	Oral presentation is difficult to hear and spoken with little intonation and expression. Little variation in tone.	Oral presentation is usually clear with some intonation and expression, using an appropriate tone most of the time.	Oral presentation is spoken clearly and audibly with expression, intonation, and appropriate tone.
Audio	The purpose of audio selection is not clear and limited. Use of music distracts the viewer and doesn't support the tone or mood of the movie.	Selection of audio supports the story, but occasionally may be distracting. Use of music usually supports the mood and tone of the movie, but not always.	There is meaningful selection of audio to accompany images and story. Deliberate selection of music to help the audience understand the mood and tone of the movie.
